The score, however, does not tell the whole story, for the Wyoming boys with about five nights practice were playing a team that had been playing the whole season. What the boys lacked in score they made up in fight. At times they showed flashes of real football especially when they held for three downs on the one yard line. Only a few of the boys had ever seen a football game previous for this one, and their showing makes us think we can expect more of them in the future.

REMIT IT. – Will Mrs. Doctor Keck please remit us that advertising bill of \$1.20, which she went away leaving unpaid? Just remit it, if you don't want another gratuitous notice.

NOTE: Keck bottled and sold herbal and botanical remedies for asthma, consumption (tuberculosis) and even blindness. Her medical practice was in Davenport but she traveled widely in Illinois and Iowa seeing patients for follow-up treatment.







What is a Disability Access Point?

A "Disability Access Points" or "DAPs" are local places that help people with disabilities, their families, and their caregivers find the services and support they need—both short-term and long-term. They are a friendly first stop for finding helpful information and services.

There are 4 agencies designated as DAPs across 7 districts in Iowa. These agencies are part of Iowa's Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) Network.

What Services are provided by DAPs?

DAPs help people with disabilities and their families find and use the services they need by providing the following services:

- Information & Assistance: DAPs give people, their families, and caregivers important information to help them make informed choices about long-term services and supports (LTSS) by
 - o Figuring out what the person needs.
 - Making sure the person knows about services and opportunities.
 - Connecting the person with local providers for the help they need (respite or home modifications).
- Options Counseling: DAPs help people understand their pathways and set goals to make informed choices on their care. The person leads the process, and they can include family members or others they trust. This usually lasts about 90 days.
- Non-Medicaid Short-Term Services and Supports (STSS): These are temporary services that help people with disabilities live in their homes and communities and provide support to their families and caregivers.
- Service Coordination for Non-Medicaid LTSS: This is a process where someone helps the person get and manage their LTSS. The person works with a coordinator to create a care plan, set goals, and choose services to meet those goals.

Who can I reach out to with concerns after July 1, 2025?

If you have any concerns or experience any issues with your services, you can reach out to your Disability Access Point.

What is a Disability Access Point (DAP)?

"Disability Access Points" or "DAPs" are local places that help people with disabilities, their families, and their caregivers find the services and support they need—both short-term and long-term. These agencies are part of Iowa's Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) Network.

In each area, DAPs will:

- · Give people and caregivers helpful information and guide them to local service providers in their community.
- Be part of the ADRC Network, working as a trusted resource center for aging and disability help.
- Team up with local leaders, individuals with disabilities and disability programs to make sure disability services are meeting community needs.

The Disability Services System (DSS) is designed to support, provide care, and connection for all lowans and families with disability-related needs.

What is an Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC)?

ADRCs (Aging and Disability Resource Centers) help make it easier for older adults and people with disabilities to find the services and support they need. They work with different partners to make sure people get the right help in a simple and easy way.

Here's what else ADRCs do:

- Answer questions and give support that fits each person's needs
- People can contact the ADRC in four main ways:
 - 1. In person
 - 2. By phone
 - 3. Through the website
 - 4. By being referred by a community partner
