## Looking Back for December 23, 2025

### Midland Times: December 15, 2000 – Page 1

#### Wyoming landmark destroyed

Billowing clouds of dense smoke covered Wyoming Wednesday afternoon and evening as the largest house in the city was destroyed by fire. The sprawling home of Arlo and Gladys Ireland on Green Street became engulfed in flames at 2 p.m.

The Wyoming Fire Department was assisted by the Oxford Junction, Onslow and Anamosa Departments. Firefighters were hampered by the intensity of the blaze, below freezing temperatures, falling snow and slick streets. The area was blocked off by Jones County sheriff's deputies and fire marshal officials. Numerous vehicles ended up in the ditch trying to get closer to the scene.

The Wyoming water tower could not keep up with the demand for water and ran dry at about 5 p.m. Water was hauled from neighboring towns, with the National Guard assisting the efforts.

*NOTE: The house at 205 E. Green Street, was Victorian style and built in the early 1900s. It was replaced in 2001 by a 3 bedroom, 2 bathroom ranch style house. Cody Dirks is the current owner.*

### Anamosa Journal: December 16, 1975 – Pages 1 and 5

Dec. 14 is a time most farmers expect to be putting the snow blade on the tractor and fighting a blizzard – instead temperatures hit a high of 60 degrees about midnight Saturday, and some four hours later a wind, from the southeast, swept across the Linn-Jones area. Even where farm buildings were not smashed, many hog shelters, sun shades, doors, etc. were rolled around and ripped off on farms in the wake of the wind. Antennas took a beating, and shingles and metal roofs went flying.

*NOTE: Among others, Richard Brownell northwest of Wyoming and Hugh Tasker northeast of Wyoming reported losing buildings and livestock.*

### The Wyoming Journal: December 24, 1925 – Page 3

#### The gift for her.

### The Wyoming Journal: December 23, 1875

LEAD DISCOVERED - A few weeks since, lead was discovered on the farm of Geo. Ward residing a few miles east of Wyoming. Specimens have been sent away for the purpose of ascertaining whether it is of rich enough yield to pay to get facilities to take it out in quantities.

*NOTE: At one time, Iowa had 115 mines listed by the United States Geological Survey (USGS). Nine of them were in Jones County.*

## Wyoming Christmas Lights History

Although there is not much written history of the lights, the following article in the December 2, 1937, Wyoming Journal, is the earliest mention of them:

“Wyoming, famous for its fall celebration, has done it again, this time with pretty colors and Christmas trees.

Now traffic goes through town between lanes of evergreen trees sparkling with lights of all colors at night. Arching across the street are rows of colored lights, and over the middle of the street hangs a great star, glowing white when dusk falls and extending to all in huge red letters the town’s wish of a ‘Merry Christmas’.

Travelers who have passed through dozens of towns stop their automobiles and say ‘Mister, I’m telling you, you’ve got the prettiest, most Christmasy town I’ve ever seen.’”

Each year correspondence similar to the above is received. One of the more memorable was referenced in a Cedar Rapids Gazette article in the December 23, 1956, edition. It recounted a mother passing through town at 3:00 am, going from Great Lakes Naval Training station where she was visiting her son. She was returning to Nebraska. “Her gloom all but disappeared as her car rounded a curve and she found herself in fairyland of multi-colored lights.” Upon returning home she wrote to the volunteer group, thanking them.

The project started with a group of volunteers, passed to the Commercial Club, then to the Wyoming Fair Association and now the Wyoming Lions Club with help from Elves.

During WWII a handful of men left behind, including Marty Botkin, were able to get the lights up. Purdy Reitz and Cecil Lambert were in charge for many years until Cecil’s untimely death due to a drunk driver.

The equipment used to get the lights up has progressed from tall ladders to ladders mounted on the back of the City dump truck and finally to forklifts with tall towers reaching more than 30’ high. The forklifts were first provided by Walters/Kennedy Lumber and now by Nutrien.

The lights have been featured on TV stations from Moline to Omaha. Many news articles have been written about them. Dave Radsal of the Cedar Rapids Gazette wrote several pieces as did Bill Wundrum of the Quad City Times. Bill always enjoyed stopping at Virginia Pace’s café for one of her LARGE pieces of pie and always mentioned the pie in his story. In 2012 the Des Moines Register sent a photographer to take pictures to use in their Iowa Christmas Lights competition - AND THE LIGHTS WON!!!!!! The lights were pictured on the front page of the December 16, 2012, edition.



For many years, the lights were stored in the Opera House above the Bank. An aging workforce and climbing the stairs necessitated a move to ground level storage.

What creates the magic of the lights? Most important of all, topography. Coming from the west, you look over the top of 4 blocks of colored lights. Then you drop down into the tunnel. There are several other minor elevation changes before the east end. The main block portion of this is covered by the 6 spiders – big overhead x’s – each having 80 red and green bulbs. They are supported by cables 30’ in the air and draping down to the sides of the street. From one end to the other and on both sides are 38 vertical boards with 8 blue bulbs each. At each end, connecting the blue boards are overhead strings of red and green bulbs. Each overhead string has 16 bulbs. Lining the main street block, connecting the spiders, are horizontal strings of 140 red, yellow, blue, and green bulbs.

The finishing touch is given by almost 40 small, decorated trees along the sidewalks. All kinds and sizes of trees have been used. Currently, cedar trees cut from the highways and gravel roads are used. If they are too big, they block the sidewalks. If they are too nice, they are subject to being “borrowed”. Some don’t look the best, but in the dark, holding lights, they are not seen and serve their purpose very well.

All of this adds up to about 3 miles of wire and over 100 places for something to not light up. Turning the lights on involves flipping 2 switches and a 3<sup>rd</sup> switch to turn other lights off. The process is reversed when it is time for the Christmas lights to be turned off. All of this is done manually. *Editor’s note: This is done manually by our very own Jim Eichhorn – twice each day, to turn the lights on about 4:30 pm, then to turn them off again at night!*

Lights on are on by 4:30 pm and at least until 10:00 pm Monday – Saturday, and until 9:00 pm on Sundays. Lights are left on overnight on Christmas Eve and New Years Eve.
